Scotland's Charity Air Ambulance (SCAA) is the People's Helicopter – saving and improving lives in every corner of Scotland, 365 days a year.

As the country's only charity-funded air ambulance, SCAA relies 100% on public donations to fuel its life-saving flights - bringing help and hope to those suffering serious injury or illness.

An integral part of Scotland's frontline emergency response network, SCAA can reach 90% of Scotland's population within 25 minutes, including remote and rural areas that are difficult to access by road. SCAA fly expert paramedic care to the scene and then provide speedy onward transfer to specialist hospitals.

SCAA has responded to hundreds of emergency call outs including traumas such as road traffic and motorcycle collisions, equestrian, skiing, cycling and industrial accidents and falls. They have also attended time-critical medical emergencies including heart attacks, strokes, seizures, cardiac arrest, anaphylactic shock, sepsis, meningitis, major organ failure and diabetes.

THE DIFFERENCE WE MAKE

STEVE'S STORY

Steve thought he had an ear infection – but deteriorated rapidly with what proved to be **Bacterial Meningitis**.

Facing a race against time to get him to hospital from a rural part of Scotland, with the quickest emergency response being helicopter – Scotland's Charity Air Ambulance (SCAA) became Steve's lifeline.



Steve's wife and a neighbour tended to the barely conscious Steve and a 999 call brought a locally-based paramedic racing to the scene, confirming suspicions of meningitis.

SCAA was able to fly to Steve's aid in minutes and paramedics worked rapidly to treat and prepare him for the flight to hospital.

Four days later Steve regained consciousness in ICU. Doctors told him there were **no guarantees he would have pulled through if SCAA hadn't got him to hospital so quickly.**

To wake up to that information was really scary, I'm reasonably fit – how could this happen to me? I thought I just had an ear infection – I could never have guessed it would be a touch-and-go race against the clock. I don't believe I would be here today without SCAA. They saved me when time was running out and I will spend the rest of my life thanking the team.

SAVING TIME, SAVING LIVES

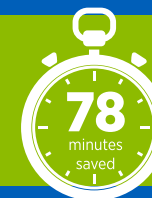
SCAA flies to every community in Scotland, often to areas that could take hours to reach by road.

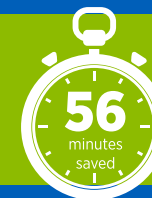

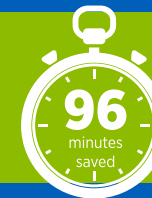
Loch Tay to Ninewells
